


Title: Application request for 2023 Global Young Creatives Residency program scheduled on September 14-20, 2023 in Jeju, Republic of Korea

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
1. Background

A. Meaning of Trees

Throughout history, people worldwide have imbued trees with their understanding and aspirations for life. Trees symbolize life, growth, wisdom, and prosperity in various realms, depicted through myths, legends, and novels. Moreover, trees have witnessed the evolution of Earth and humanity alongside us, and will continue to bear witness to our changes and adapt itself with us. Therefore, trees hold the spirits and lifestyles of our ancestors.



B. Why Jeju? : Symbol of Richness



"Jeju is an oval-shaped volcanic island¹ spanning 73 kilometers east-to-west and 41 kilometers north-to-south with Hallasan Mountain standing 1,950 meters high in the center of the island. Roughly 360 large and small oreums (volcanic cones) are scattered all over the island, and some 160 lava tubes run beneath the surface, which is a very rare case in the world for a small island to have so many *oreums* and lava tubes. The unique value of Jeju was eventually recognized by the world². Starting with its designation as a Biosphere Reserve in 2002, Jeju was listed as a UNESCO Heritage in 2007 and a Global Geopark in 2010." In addition to these tangible heritages, Jeju's local cultures (i.e. Jeju Chilmeoridang Yeongdeunggut in 2009 and the Culture of Jeju Haenyeo in 2016) were listed as the UNESCO's Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity. In sum, Jeju is renowned for its unique environment including its distinctive topography, geology, flora, and fauna. All became the base for Jeju to be the home to four UNESCO Titles³.

Probably because Jeju has many natural attractions that are abundant with trees, such as Gotjawal, Bijarim Forest, Gyorae Natural Recreation Forest that kindly invite people for relieving stress¹, engaging in self-healing², and promoting overall wellbeing³, Jeju has become an attractive magnet for artists⁴ such as Lee Jung Seob, Kim Chang Yeol, Lee Wal-Chong, and Byun Shi-Ji, who find inspirations in Jeju's beauty.

However, due to rapid environmental changes and depletion of both tangible and intangible resources, Jeju's trees are currently facing a growth crisis. For example, fir trees officially named as *Abies koreana* and unofficially known as the Christmas Tree, which inhabit Halla Mountain within Jeju, have experienced a significant decline in their wild population over the past 20 years, losing nearly half of their numbers due to rising temperatures⁵.

Other than its rich nature, Jeju is also known as the Island of World⁶ Peace since 2005. Jeju emerged as a hub for peace and exchanges in East Asia. Above all, Jeju's spirit of "*Sammu*" (three non-existences) and its resilience in overcoming the tragedy of the April 3rd incident elevated its significance. The "*Sammu*" spirit, which emphasizes the unity and cooperation of the community, is a traditional value of Jeju, symbolizing the absence of thieves, gates, and beggars.

C. Global Young Creatives Residency scheduled in September 2023 at Jeju


Given this, the Jeju Special Self-Governing Province has been organizing the Global Young Creatives Residency programs composed of domestic and foreign artists since 2018 to inspire participating artists to be more creative by enabling them to utilize Jeju's unique natural environment. During the previous years, such programs were arranged with a focus on:

- 2018: Culture, urban planning, and public spaces
- 2019: Having fun, contemporary leisure through culture and art
- 2021: Islands in Flow
 - Inside (identity / human rights / diversity)
 - Outside (boundary / rural / local),
 - Ocean (environmental crisis / coexistence)
 - Unseen forces (wave / wind / invisible /artistic inspiration)
- 2022: Islands in Flow II
 - The fluid state of a global pandemic
 - Climate change and the changing boundaries
 - Changes in self and other, and creative and open potentials
- 2023: Rooted, Growing Island

This year, the Global Young Creatives Residency chooses to center itself around the theme of "tree," aiming to select a topic that can resonate with people worldwide and convey the value of Jeju's distinctiveness and sustainability. The specific themes of this year's Global Young Creatives Residency are designed and created, drawing inspiration from the structure and growth of trees as follows:

First of all, as 'Roots' grounded in the unique soil of Jeju's region and its community, the Global Young Creatives Residency takes its initial significant step by learning and understanding the environment and tradition of Jeju. Moreover, it highlights art practices in diverse fields that contribute to the preservation of fundamental values of sustainability, akin to 'Tree trunks.' Lastly, the Residency to foster connections between Jeju's artists and art experts from across the globe, allowing creative 'Branches and leaves' to flourish abundantly.

By visiting natural and man-made landscapes that can inspire, and by providing ample time and comfortable places for participants to exchange ideas, in addition to experts' lectures, the Global Young Creatives Residency aims to foster a profound artistic connection that can not only encapsulates the essence of Jeju but also attracts global attention through collaboration with local artists and world-class art experts.

- 2023 Global Young Creatives Residency (GYCR) is an international exchange art project under the theme of "Rooted, Growing Island" that brings together young cultural and artistic experts from around the world in Jeju to collectively explore the intersection of arts and sustainability for the present and future.
- This project, which will be held as a form of Art Week, enables participants to exchange experiences and inspiration through various programs centered around three sub-themes:
 - Roots: Jeju's environmental and traditional heritage
 - Tree trunk: Sustainability and the Arts
 - Branches and leaves: Practical connections and expansion worldwide
- The multidisciplinary escapade experience begins here in Jeju by inviting internationally renowned experts and selecting participating artists at an international level.

3. Application requirements and Support to participants

• Eligibilities

- Age: Those who are born between January 1, **1983** and December 31, **2003** are eligible to apply.
- Language: Those who can communicate in English
- Supports
 - Transportation: JITC will reimburse for a round trip to and from the participants' country of origin with a cap. Yet, reimbursement must be accompanied by proofs of purchase in participants' name only.
 - Accomodations (including 3 meals a day) will be provided by JITC.

We hope that the Global Young Creatives Residency, which will continue to be held in the future, will continue to grow and flourish like a beautiful forest.


