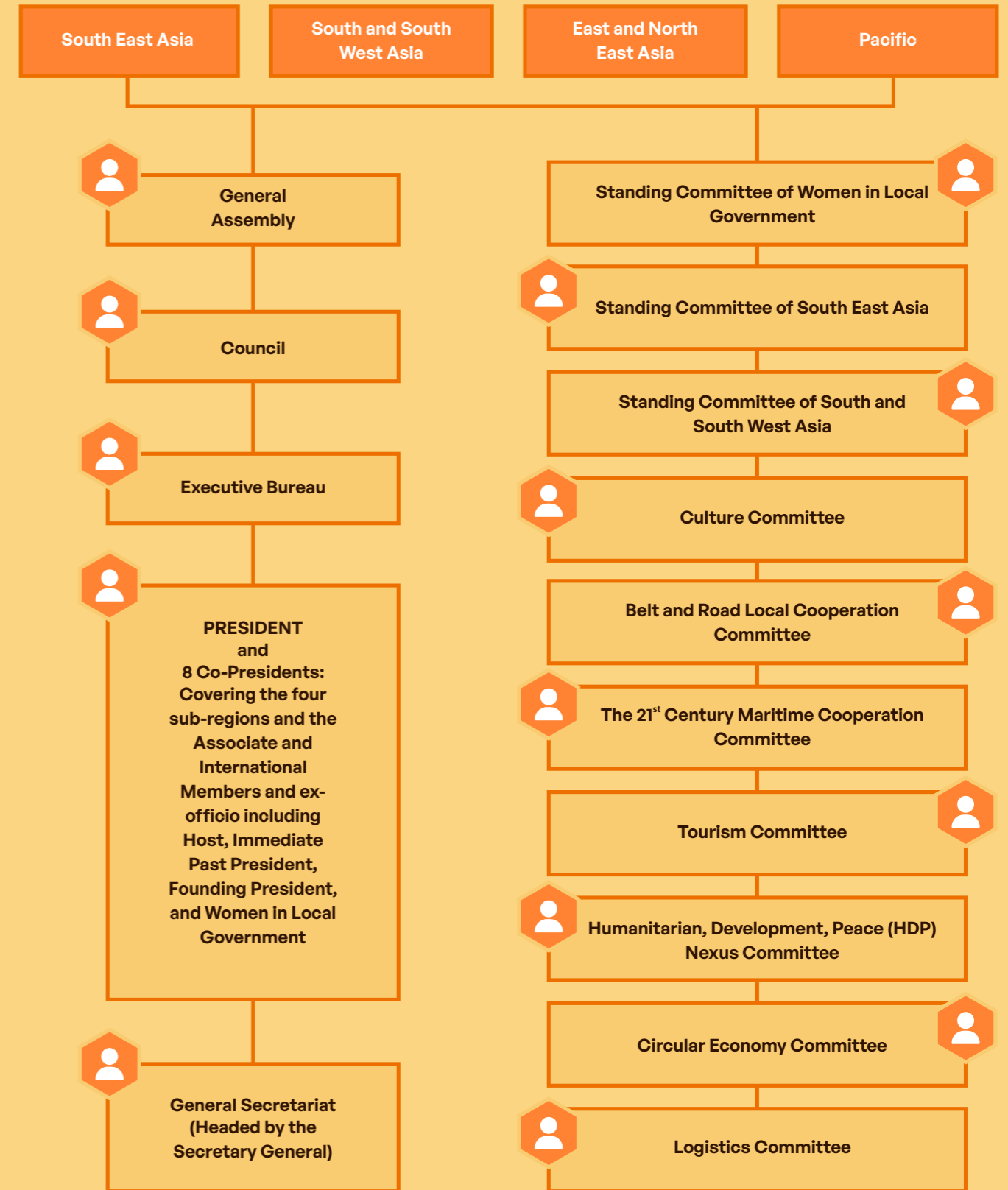

UCLG ASPAC comprises four sub-regions and all members are represented in the General Assembly, the supreme organ that is responsible for the overall policy, direction, and oversight of the Section. The Council is the principal policy-making body. It decides UCLG ASPAC's policies in a collegial way and ensures that general policies adopted by the General Assembly are implemented. The Executive Bureau is responsible for initiating proposals and carrying out the decisions of the Council. The Presidency, comprising the President and co-Presidents, represents all four sub-regions, the Associate and International Members, as well as ex-officio namely the Host, Immediate Past President, Founding President, and Women in Local Government. The President is the principal representative of UCLG ASPAC. The co-Presidents assist the President in carrying out his/her responsibilities and when necessary assume the role of President. The Secretary General directs the daily activities of UCLG ASPAC and carries out the decisions of the General Assembly, the Council and the Executive Bureau. The Secretary General manages the General Secretariat as well as the activities and programmes under the guidance of the Presidency and the responsibility of the Executive Bureau.

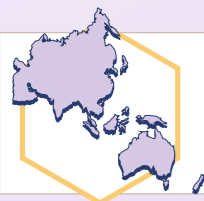

9th UCLG ASPAC Congress: New Leadership, Cities Invigorated to Advance Economic Development in the Asia-Pacific Region

UCLG ASPAC successfully organised the 9th UCLG ASPAC Congress taking the theme “Advancing Balanced Economic Development for Asia and the Pacific,” hosted by the Yiwu Municipal People’s Government and the Chinese People’s Association for Friendship with Foreign Countries (CPAFFC) from November 13-15, 2023. UCLG ASPAC took the 9th Congress to the next level, emboldening cities and local governments to rise to their highest potentialities, particularly to attain the Sustainable Development Goals. The Congress also accelerated cities’ endeavours for development and sustainability through a Trade Matchmaking session.

ASEAN Mayors Forum: Fortifies Collaboration among ASEAN Cities and Local Governments

UCLG ASPAC, as the ASEAN Mayors Forum (AMF) Secretariat, successfully organised the 2023 AMF hosted by the Jakarta Special Capital Region on August 1-2, 2023. For the second time, the AMF and the Meeting of Governors and Mayors of ASEAN Capitals (MGMAC) were held jointly.

Insights and Recommendations for Cities

UCLG ASPAC - MoHA: Towards Prolific Collaboration

UCLG ASPAC, and the Ministry of Home Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia (MoHA), successfully held the 2023 meeting of Coordination and Evaluation of the Cooperation, hosted by City Government of Jambi, on February 27-28, 2023. The meeting is part of the UCLG ASPAC-MoHA agreement to ensure the increased participation of and benefits for member cities and local governments in Indonesia, the host country of the UCLG ASPAC Secretariat. The meeting brought more than 100 city officials representing 26 Indonesian cities and regencies, MoHA, the State Secretary, and the National Secretariat for SDGs/Ministry of National Development Planning of Indonesia. In this meeting, UCLG ASPAC also invited PT Sarana Multi Infrastruktur (SMI), a State-Owned Enterprise dedicated to achieving sustainable development for investors, government, and society.

Cities' Voices, Insights For Future Collaborations

- City of Samarinda, City of Jambi, City of Pangkal Pinang, City of Banjarmasin, and Regency of Ogan Komering Ilir shared their positive responses and expectations for upcoming activities, including capacity building for labour; expert certification; creative economy programme; green building; assistance to develop VLR; eco-tourism; internship/secondment programme and short-courses for Indonesian local governments; and knowledge exchange on carbon trade.
- City Government of Yogyakarta and Regency Government of North Minahasa also shared positive feedbacks and the North Minahasa Regency specifically proposed to get facilitation for collaboration and cooperation to develop their eco-tourism and optimise opportunities for their commodity (coconut oil).

Responses by UCLG ASPAC Secretary General Dr. Bernadia:

- For facilitation of international cooperation, local governments can draft a plan on their expected international cooperation, which includes their priorities.
- For learning exchange, UCLG ASPAC will explore internship opportunities for Indonesia's local governments to city members in other countries in the region.
- For Carbon Trade issues, UCLG ASPAC will hold a workshop on carbon trade by inviting competent speakers.

in line with the upcoming plans. Dr. Bernadia also took the opportunity to highlight the importance of membership fees. She mentioned that it keeps the Organisation independent to take necessary actions including amplify the voice of local governments.



Knowledge Sharing with PT SMI, Bappenas, and Seoul Metropolitan Government

This was a space for better understanding on alternative financing for climate actions; introduction of VLR to increase the knowledge of local government in developing the inclusive SDGs report that contributes to the VNR; good practices of Seoul delivered by UCLG ASPAC Secondee from Seoul Metropolitan Government (SMG) in becoming eco-friendly and liveable city.

Site Visit

All participants joined site-visit to the project location of the Integrated Resource Recovery Centre (IRRC) Waste to Energy (WTE) in Talang Banjar Market and Sanitary Landfill in Talang Gulo (TPA Talang Gulo). IRRC is a 2016 grant project from the United Nations Environment and Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UNESCAP) in partnership with UCLG ASPAC. Participants also visited the Talang Gulo sanitary landfill, developed from a collaboration between the Government of Indonesia and the Government of Germany in the Emission Reduction in Cities-Solid Waste Management (ERIC-SWM) Programme, and participated in tree planting as part of the Jambi-UNESCAP-UCLG ASPAC air-pollution programme and visited the location of leachate treatment.



UCLG ASPAC-MoHA Collaborations

UCLG ASPAC and MoHA also collaborated in developing capacity building and training activities. Throughout 2023, several trainings were conducted, such as in collaboration with the Open Government Indonesia (OGI).

UCLG ASPAC at the 10th APFSD: Collective Power of Local Governments

UCLG ASPAC partook in the 10th Asia-Pacific Forum on Sustainable Development from March 27 to 30, 2023, held in Bangkok, Thailand, under the framework of Asia-Pacific Local Government Coordinating Body (APLG), the regional coordination mechanism of local governments in the region.

Theme: “Accelerating the recovery from the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) and the full implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development at all levels in Asia and the Pacific”. The Forum assessed progress on the following Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs): Goal 6 (Clean Water and Sanitation); Goal 7 (Affordable and Clean Energy); Goal 9 (Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure); Goal 11 (Sustainable Cities and Communities) and Goal 17 (Partnership for the Goals).



UCLG ASPAC led the preparation of the Joint Statement of Local Authorities to the APFSD which was delivered by UCLG ASPAC Secretary General Dr. Bernadia Irawati Tjandradewi at the plenary session on March 27, 2023, highlighting the need for local level SDG indicators in line with the national frameworks, capacity building for local governments in Least Developed Countries especially the Pacific on the Voluntary Local Review (VLR), and innovative financing and investment to localise the SDGs.

Municipalities Network Advocacy on Sanitation in South Asia (Phase - II)

UCLG ASPAC, supported by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation (BMGF), is implementing the Municipalities Network Advocacy on Sanitation in South Asia (MuNASS) programme in the South Asia region focusing on Bangladesh and Nepal to strengthen the capacity of municipalities and municipal associations in designing and implementing City Wide Inclusive Sanitation (CWIS). This investment has facilitated the learning of important lessons on how to fill SDG data gaps, made available important advocacy tools, and developed a scalable model for engaging municipalities to achieve SDG 6.2 within and beyond South Asia.

Key achievements

Policy Advocacy

- ★ Provided feedback on the Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) Policy, Joint Sector Review WASH Workshops in Madhesh Province, led the initiation of CWIS Guideline Indicators Validation Workshop (by MuAN);
- ★ Completed study on Sanitation Data Management by MAB focused on SDG 6.2 showing lower achievements of SDG 6 than the data found in SDG tracker, supportive to Sanitation data management policy level to reduce data gap;
- ★ Accomplished five national-level advocacy events including Policy Dialogue on Urban Sanitation and Shit Flow Diagram (SFD) Institutionalisation with more than 810 attendees including Mayors, Deputy Mayors, Municipal Staffs and Development partners;
- ★ Drafted Seven By Laws to support pilot cities in Nepal as largest number of Policy support in Nepal;
- ★ Successfully organised CWIS Conclave in Nepal participated by more than 270 City Leaders, National Leaders, High Officials (by MuAN) with leaders' commitment to implement CWIS approach in Nepal.

Capacity building

- 🔑 In the seven province of Nepal, 638 participants have received orientation on CWIS;
- 🔑 Three teams from Nepal and one team from Bangladesh participated at the CWIS Learning Visit (SaniTour) in Hyderabad and Warangal of Telangana and Odisha (India) to learn from Best Practices Sanitation City on CWIS for the city leaders.
- 🔑 In Bangladesh, Press Institute Bangladesh and MAB has jointly organised orientation for National Media personnels;

- 🔑 The SFD exercises took place in 52 Municipalities of Nepal with 29 reports published by international platform SuSanA. DWSS in Nepal has agreed to incorporate a dashboard on Sanitation under their NWASH System and to add SFDs for greater audience and support;
- 🔑 Gender Equity and Social Inclusion (GESI) Unit has been given an orientation on CWIS followed by a need of assessment workshop. In Bangladesh, GESI Unit has initiated the activity to raise the awareness of mass people in cities and stakeholders on Safe Public Toilet for women.
- 🔑 Waling Municipality in Nepal has completed the construction of Faecal Sludge Treatment Plant (FSTP) and is now under a trial run. By October, it will upgrade its system and become fully functional. The business plan has also been prepared and revalidated by the Municipality.
- 🔑 In Bangladesh, Lalmonirhat and Bera Municipalities have completed the construction of FSTP with the support of the government fund and already started operations.
- 🔑 Lalmonirhat Municipality Sanitation Business Plan has been presented as part of the upcoming module at the Asia Pacific Mayors Academy and was well appreciated by workshop participants.
- 🔑 National Institute of Local Government (NILG) under the Ministry of Local Government in Bangladesh has updated National Sanitation Training Manual with the support from MuNASS in collaboration with MAB.
- 🔑 FSTP of Dhulikhel Municipality has been upgraded to Co treatment plant.

🔑 Sanitation Excellence Awards

UCLG ASPAC held Sanitation Excellence Awards and declared Ratnanagar Municipality of Nepal and Kushtia Municipality of Bangladesh as winners of Sanitation Excellence Award at the UCLG ASPAC Executive Bureau meeting (Kathmandu). Second round of Sanitation Excellence award winners: Warangal City Corporation, India, Waling Municipality of Nepal, Sakhipur Municipality of Bangladesh, and Tangerang Regency of Indonesia. Independent Evaluation committee led by the sector experts evaluated the award applications.

MuNASS IEC Materials

MuNASS Phase 2 has published valuable knowledge materials to support SDG 6.2 in both Nepal and Bangladesh. Sustainable Finance Department in Bangladesh has published number of guidelines for private sector, MAB has made a compendium and shared with cities to get access to finance for private sectors to address FSM. MuAN in Nepal has published SFD reports in both local and international level. 29 Reports have already been published. A literature on SFD, Poster on Safe Sanitation, Sticker, one video have been published.

Local Empowerment, Advocacy and Development (LEAD) for Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) Localisation in Pakistan

UCLG ASPAC under the framework of LEAD for SDGs programme, jointly funded by the European Union, supported local governments in Pakistan to localise the SDGs, for sharing learnings on SDGs localisation at regional level. In year 2023, the programme concluded its support. Below is the summary of its journey this year.

January 6, 23, 2023 | Karachi

Local Councils Association Sindh organised a day-long consecutive Provincial Policy Dialogues on Localisation and Implementation of 'SDG 3 Health and Well-being' and 'SDG 4 Quality Education' in Karachi on January 6 and 23, 2023 respectively.



January 26, 2023 | Islamabad

Collaborating with the strategic stakeholder of LEAD for SDGs project, National Assembly of Pakistan's SDGs Secretariat, LEAD jointly arranged the inauguration ceremony of the SDGs Knowledge Hub (SKH). Developed by LEAD4SDGs in close coordination with The Federal Minister for Planning Development and Special Initiatives (PD&SI), SKH is to support the Government of Pakistan in supplementing the knowledge and information on the localisation of SDGs for development practitioners, policy, academia, and decision-makers to play a more effective role in sustainable local development through the realisation of SDGs Localisation in Pakistan.



February 16, 2023 | Islamabad

The project partnered with the National Assembly of Pakistan's SDGs Secretariat and arranged an all-day National Dialogue on the localisation of the SDGs containing fruitful technical sessions on "Parliamentary Oversight of the SDGs, Local-level Reporting on SDGs and Identifying the Role of Local Governments in Achieving the Agenda 2030."

The conference brought together a diverse range of stakeholders, including policymakers, government officials, experts, and representatives from civil society organisations.

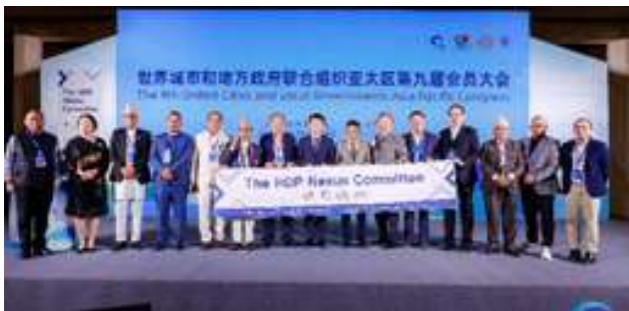

“The GRPB in local government is important. This issue is a two-pronged approach that includes a top-down approach, which is Responsiveness in local government budgeting, and a bottom-up approach, which is “Participatory” to ensure community (particularly women) participation. Instead of having a separate budget for women, GRPB is an important tool to improve the transparency, accountability, effectiveness, and efficiency of the management of public expenditure and provides for a more equitable distribution of public finances for women and men.

Asia-Pacific Mayors Academy: Supporting City Leaders' Capacity Building and Networking

UCLG ASPAC supports capacity building and networking of city leaders in the Asia-Pacific region under the framework of the Asia-Pacific Mayors Academy, a collaborative framework with the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP), the United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-Habitat), the United Nations University, Institute for the Advanced Study of Sustainability (UNU-IAS), the Association of Pacific Rim Universities (APRU), and Institute for Global Environmental Strategies (IGES).

In 2023, the Asia-Pacific Mayors Academy virtually launched and held its first two modules on April 4 and 18, 2023. A total of 13 Mayors from four countries comprise the fourth batch including Hang Tuah Jaya and Rompin (Malaysia), Bedkot, Bheri, Phikkal, and Hetauda (Nepal), Anilao, Badiangan, Calapan, Cauayan, Iligan, and Ormoc (Philippines), and Nakhon Si Thammarat (Thailand).

Module 1 (Cities 2030) introduced global development frameworks mainly the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its linkages with the Paris Climate Change Agreement, Sendai Framework, New Urban Agenda, and Addis Ababa Action Agenda. It highlighted that all the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) have an urban dimension which underscored the importance of cities in achieving them.



During their self-introductions, Mayors identified the following challenges for sustainable urban development in their cities: insufficient financial resources; lack of technical capacity for disaster preparedness, climate change adaptation, and sustainable waste management; lack of adequate infrastructure; and limited public awareness and engagement on sustainable development.



Module 2 (COVID-19 Recovery) established the link between the SDGs and COVID-19 recovery and introduced the Voluntary Local Review (VLR). In her opening message, UCLG ASPAC Secretary General Dr. Bernadia Irawati Tjandradewi acknowledged how local actions can shape the future of cities and how local solutions contribute to the regional recovery. UCLG ASPAC President Mayor Ashok Kumar Byanju Shrestha shared his experience in developing Dhulikhel Municipality's VLR which enabled connection with the federal and provincial governments, and collaboration with different stakeholders. The VLR showcased their work on SDGs 1, 2, 4, and 6, and on participatory governance through the stakeholder councils for women, youth, and people with disabilities. Dhulikhel Municipality's VLR is the first in Nepal and South Asia.

Facilitating Cities in Smart City Innovation Lab

UCLG ASPAC was engaged by the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UNESCAP) to support the implementation of the "SCIL" Smart City Innovation Integration Project (October 2021-2023), a project to respond to the rapid population growth in cities across the Asia-Pacific region, which has brought about challenges such as traffic congestion, pollution, waste management, environmental degradation, and the increasing potential for a digital revolution. This project fostered innovation in the region by facilitating collaboration among cities, start-ups, major technology companies, and key development stakeholders to implement and expand technological solutions for sustainable urban development.



RESULT: The SCIL project selected Chiangmai, Sihanoukville, and Surabaya for implementation and local startups as service providers for respective pilot cities: Jaramba (Surabaya), GEPP (Sihanoukville), and Ally Generation (Chiang Mai).

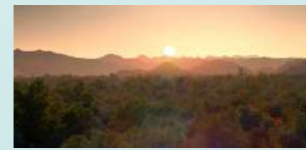

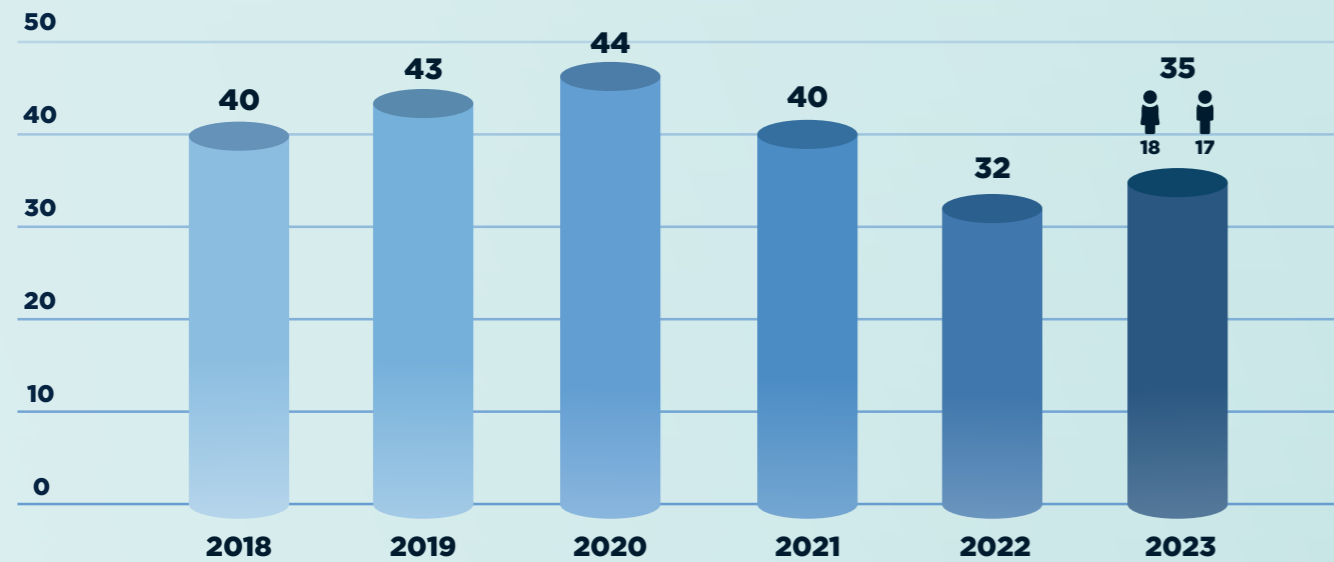
Strengthening the Secretariat

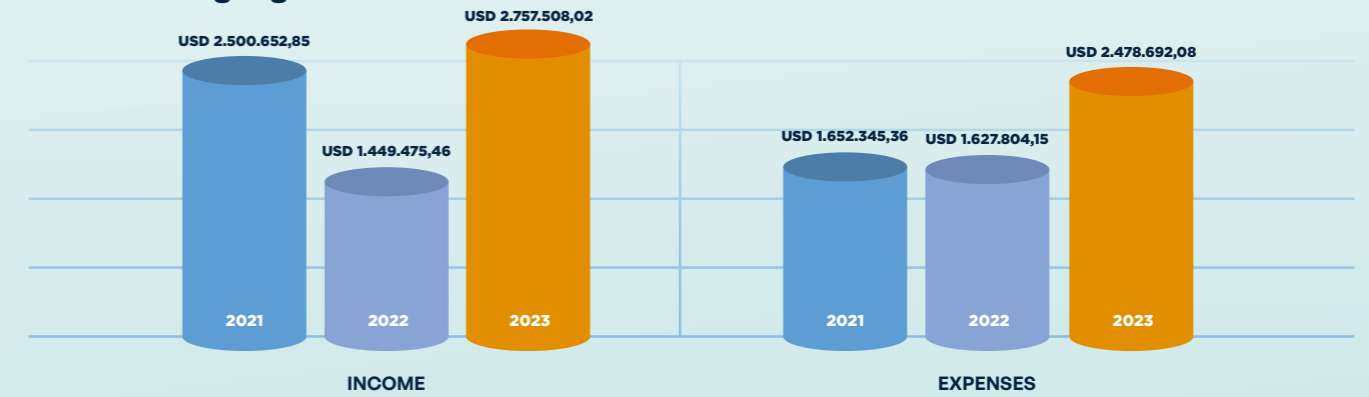

Number Of Employees*

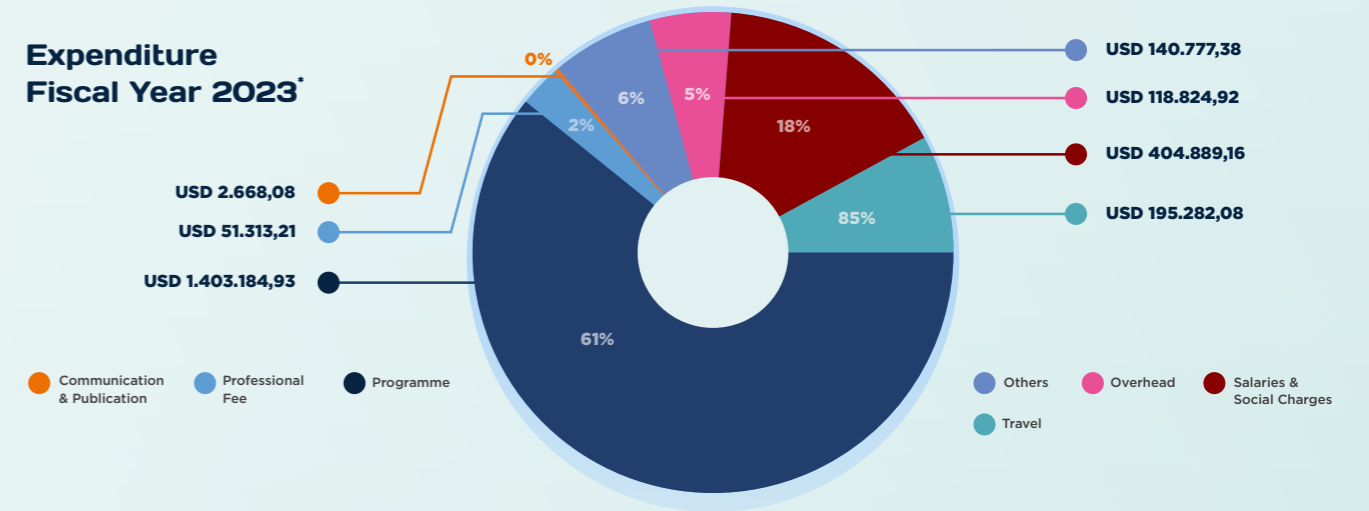

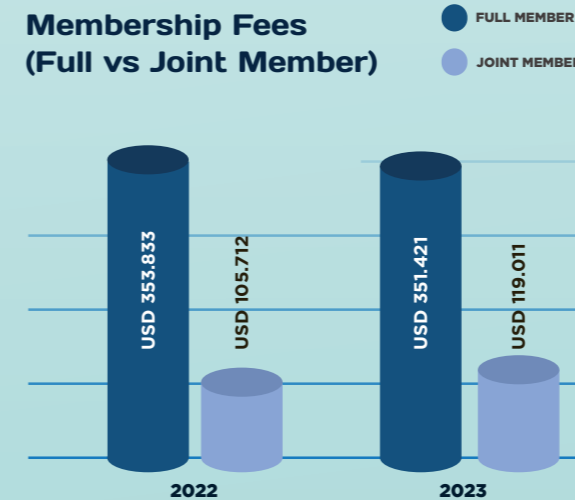

- Organisations and local governments host and partially finance the Statutory Meetings and the programme activities.

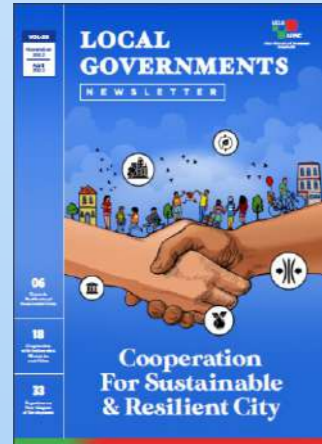
